#### 1. THE UNIVERSITY

#### 1.1.History

AUR, founded in 1969 as an institution for study-abroad students, was incorporated in the District of Columbia in 1970. It was licensed by the Education Licensure Commission of the District of Columbia in 1986 to offer Bachelor and Associate Degrees and graduated its first class in 1987. It is currently licensed by the Delaware Department of Education. AUR is the oldest degree-granting American university in Rome. It has been accredited by the Middle States Commission on Higher Education (MSCHE) since March 2010 and was previously accredited by the Accrediting Council for Independent Colleges and Schools (ACICS) from August 1992, until it voluntarily withdrew in June 2010. In Italy, AUR is registered as a legal entity with the Rome Tribunal and it is authorized to operate in Italy by the Ministry of Education, Universities and Research.

The American University of Rome (AUR) is a small university of around 600 students, offering undergraduate and graduate degree programs of the highest quality. The university is the oldest American degree-granting institution in Rome, Italy. Since 1969 AUR has provided an American liberal arts and pre-professional education to students from across the globe, currently offering 10 Bachelors and 3 MA degrees. Overlooking the historical center of Rome from atop the Janiculum Hill, AUR's campus offers a safe and peaceful environment for learning and provides spectacular views of the city and surrounding hills. All programs (except Italian language classes) are taught in English.

AUR is a first-choice university for students seeking an international learning experience through well-established programs and as a popular destination for study abroad students. AUR excels in international higher education and is long-time partner with renowned universities in the U.S. to provide a range of academically rigorous, locale-based programs that meet the needs and aspiration of study-abroad students. Our programs are carefully integrated with the students' home institution's programming for the optimal transferability of credits.

Although global in its outlook, AUR is also firmly rooted in the local community, with strong links to Italian and European institutions. Its highly qualified faculty are active researchers with established or growing reputations and expert teachers using up-to-date pedagogies and instructional technologies to create the most effective learning environments.

AUR's academic programs are defined by their:

- combination of theoretical understanding with practical experience and classes are often taught on-site throughout Rome, Italy and beyond.
- abundant opportunities to gain real-world work experience through internships with national and international commercial companies and NGOs.
- small class sizes with a low student-to-staff ratio and an intimate learning environment focused on in-depth discussions.

As a multi-cultural university that recruits students and faculty from around the globe, AUR understands that diversity is fundamental to our institutional success and delivery on mission and vision. Not only does diversity stand as one of the five pillars of our University Strategic Plan, we place great value on the academic, social, and broader community benefits that arise from a diverse community. #### Mission






